#### Why?

"Why, mommy?" "Why, daddy?" That little three-letter word why can be the most important word in a child's vocabulary ... at least in those early years before the youngster finds a computer and learns how to search the wide world for answers. That little word is the verbal button that opens up young minds to understanding the big universe of which they are such an important part. "Why?" and the answers it elicits can shape and direct young minds to their fullest potential.

But even for adults, and especially for adults involved in helping others, "Why?" is still the most important question we can ask, because why we do something makes all the difference in the world.

Our reasons should first of all center on those we help. It was compassion pure and simple that prompted Jesus to heal the sick, give sight to the blind, mobility to the crippled, hearing to the deaf. We help others to relieve their sadness or pain, to alleviate their hunger or loneliness, to break through their ignorance and enrich their lives. And we give out of gratitude; as we count our blessings we are prompted to bless others by sharing bits of our life – out time, our material goods, our love.

Jesus warned his disciples to "beware of practicing your righteousness before men to be noticed by them." He continued: "When you give to the poor, do not sound

a trumpet before you, as hypocrites do the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be honored by men." (Matthew 6:1-2) So how do we explain the seeming conflict between the best of motivational intentions and seeking – indeed needing – publicity? We want out activities advertised, we look to get our pictures in the paper. We want people to know about the International Order of Alhambra and about Porto Charities. It boils down, I think, to the difference between bragging ("Look at me!") and evangelizing ("Look at what you too can do to help others!").

Why do we do what we do? To reach out to others with help and to express our thanks for all that God does for us. Why do we tell others what we are doing? To give them the opportunity to show compassion, to experience joy, to do, in short, what our Faith impels us to do.

Why do we do what we do? To reassure those whom we help that God loves them – and reinforce our own understanding of the same – and to spread the Good News that others can do the same thing along with us.

Porto function. We went and we immediately felt at home. The members were welcoming and friendly and Elizabeth was comfortable, even though she was a bit younger than most of the young adults. The food and libations were good and the event was casual and fun!

Mike Eisenberg recognized a man he used to work with, Bill Mundy, and became very interested in what Porto had to offer to the special needs community. It didn't take long for Mike to roll up his sleeves and offer to help Porto on several committees, focusing on housing.

When a volunteer opportunity came up for a photographer, Maria jumped in. A long time Creative Memories consultant and avid lover of photos, being Porto's photographer offered a wonderful way to become involved. One of Maria's goal is to put together some event photo albums in addition to a year-end slide show that everyone, especially the young adults, will enjoy.

The Porto events have been a wonderful way for the Eisenbergs to socialize with the other families in the Evangelist program and to get to meet the families of the young adults. The friendships and networking with other families has been invaluable, especially to get a glimpse from the pathfinders at what Elizabeth's future needs will be in order to someday have an independent life.

Mike and Maria Eisenberg live in Vienna and have three children: Jerry, 22, Daniel, 20, and Elizabeth, 15. Jerry is a

Mike and Maria are both originally from New York state; Mike from Saratoga Springs and Maria from Middletown. Prior to living in Vienna they lived in Boca Raton, FL. Mike is a portfolio manager at Wells Fargo and Maria is a retired registered dietitian.

The Eisenbergs moved to Virginia 17 years ago and Elizabeth was born the year after they moved. She was a beautiful, healthy baby and they immediately made up their minds that they would do everything they could to see her reach her full potential. Her first five years were a blur of therapies and programs in and outside of the home but they enjoyed a tremendous support system in their Lakevale neighborhood. Elizabeth attended dance lessons, music lessons, piano lessons, and swim lessons, in addition to all the traditional therapies: physical, occupational, speech.

Elizabeth attended Flint Hill Elementary school through sixth grade. Her

mother's dream was that she would be able to go to St. Mark and be educated in a Catholic community. There was an opening for Elizabeth for 7th grade. St. Mark and The Evangelist program were a perfect fit and Elizabeth flourished spiritually and academically and, her specialty, socially. Mom and Dad are extremely proud that she is the program's first graduate.

Now Elizabeth attends Paul VI where she is a rising sophomore. She was an active junior varsity cheerleader last year and participated in Special Olympics. This fall she

will cheer and help with the girls varsity volleyball team. The Options program at PVI has been another perfect fit for Elizabeth. In addition to her other activities,



she also enjoys horseback riding and accompanying Mike on trail rides.

Elizabeth would like to work with small children or groom dogs or cook. She has great organizational skills that she would also like to put to use.

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#### **PCI Housing Committee**

Two homes within proximity of George Mason University will be renting space to LIFE program graduates. A third home has a purchase contract pending from another family from our housing initiative. Additionally, there has been

contact with an individual who has two properties adjacent to one another that are being contemplated as group homes. The properties are not adjacent to GMU, but are within a short driving distance. A one-year timeline is likely, should things develop.

Our recent telephone follow-up with some of our initial survey respondents re-enforced the prevailing preference to rent first before purchasing property. This will enable the living arrangements and interaction aspects to play out and identify underlying issues.

#### **Fairfax Housing Issues**

Fairfax County is working on a new zoning amendment to allow builders to construct studio apartments for lower income individuals (less than \$45,120 per year). Our young adults more than likely meet this criteria at the present time and in future years. (See attached PDF in the email for a copy of the memo from Fairfax County to developers, advocates, and interested parties.)

I have attended several meetings and this proposal is advantageous for us. Rents for 80% of the units would be up to \$650 per month; the other 20% would be at market rates. Units must be a maximum of 500 square feet and have full kitchens (this size of 340-500 sq. ft.

works well for one person). Units would be rented to teachers, policemen, firemen and others below the \$45,120 income threshold. Zoning would be allowed on any lot in the County with the only caveat being that you need to meet front, side, and rear yard setbacks. Maximum height limits will remain as currently zoned. They can be in neighborhoods, commercial/industrial areas, or anywhere in the County with a minimal zoning change cost of \$1,000-\$2,000 (a steal) vs. \$20-30,000 to change zoning to meet studio guidelines.

This is a great opportunity to solve our housing needs and we could even raise funds to build it ourselves. To help the County with its decision, please email the following letter (or use your own words) by to donna.pesto@fairfaxcounty.gov at your earliest convenience. Even though the initial deadline was June 14<sup>th</sup>, we have been told to go ahead and submit comments.

I support the Draft Residential Studio Zoning Amendment. I am the parent of an individual with an intellectual disability who currently lives at home. I am concerned about how his/her needs will be met as we age and can no longer provide for him/her. This amendment would make affordable housing available near a source of transportation and provide an opportunity to live side by side with many people from different walks of life.
